PASTOR'S MESSAGE

I have been asked about the current state of Israel and where we as a nation and a church stand with regard to Israel. There has also been a lot of interest in a recent UN resolution that the Obama administration either failed to block or was working behind the scenes to craft. To understand the situation we need to go back a few decades. After Hitler's genocide of over 12 million Jews, Stalin's killings of Jews and Europe's history of anti-Semitism, it was decided the Jewish people needed their own state. A UN resolution was enacted in 1947 that would make that a reality.

The founding of Israel would come at a cost; Palestinians who lived in these regions were dispossessed. Imagine how we in the UP would have felt if the UP had been given for land for the Jews in 1947 and our families were dispossessed? To their credit today most Palestinians live peaceably with Israel either in their own land or working in Israel. The terrorist are, of course, working hard to foment chaos and death trying to destabilize the region.

Israel becoming a state thrust them into international politics. Two wars the first in 1947-1948 and the second the 1967 "six-day war" concluded with Israel extending its territories at the expense of the Arab states

that attacked them. The UN has tried to work for peace in this region since the founding of Israel. Israel actually gave back some of the territories it gained in the wars for the "Land for Peace" deal. This enabled land to be set aside for a Palestinian state. The terrorists have been working hard to undo any peace agreements between the Jews and the Palestinians. Israel did not receive the promised peace upon giving up land for peace.

So why is the international community so fixated with Israel? The UN permanent Security Council whose approval is needed for any resolution to reach the floor is comprised of certain nations. Russia and China are two such nations and they are close allies with Iran. Iran is the main sponsor of terror in the Middle East and has a policy articulated by their previous "president" of not only destroying Israel but killing all the Jews in Israel. So China and Russia will keep supporting their allies and their attempts to punish Israel through the UN. The UK and France are also on the permanent Security Council, but Europe only wants to play the "good cop" to America's "bad cop". In this way they can be the "peace brokers" between the "hotter heads". Europe will not protect Israel on the (Continued on page 2)

That means the only one on the Security Council who protects Israel is America. America has done this for decades, until the Obama administration decided in the last few days to break with that precedent. What does this mean for Israel? Israel could be "forced" into unfavorable parameters for peace due to this most recent UN resolution. A lot depends on what comes out of a January peace summit and another possible UN resolution before Obama leaves office. The new administration will undoubtedly try to undo this and any other actions against Israel, but it could be difficult and complicate international politics and America's relations with other nations.

Given that Israel is surrounded by enemies, has powerful nations such as Russia and China against it for the sake of Iran and other allies, and Europe has shown no desire to protect Israel, this move by the Obama administration is troubling. Psalm 122:6 tells us to "Pray for the peace of Israel..." Maybe this should be one of our New Year's resolutions to pray for the peace of Israel.

Purchasing Items for the Church

The first of the year is always a good time to remind everyone of proper procedures for the running of the church, so we are taking this opportunity to discuss buying things for the church.

We have a procedure in place that makes sure purchases are recorded properly, that we save money by taking advantage of our tax free status as much as possible, and that we maintain our approved budget and don't spend more than we should be from any of the church funds. It's a fairly straight forward process and to make it even easier purchase order request forms have been placed in their own mail box outside the office.

So – here goes:

Transfer conf # and date

Prior to making a purchase for the church:

Obtain and fill in the purchase order — if you are unsure of some of the information, contact the office to either gather the correct information or to be directed to the proper committee. The form will require the requester's name, what the purchase is and what it is for, how much it will be, and where the money is being distributed from.

Once the form is complete, turn it into the office so the committee chair, or designated person, can be contacted to sign off on the purchase. Once this has been done, the requester will be contacted to either make the purchase or be told that the request was denied, and why.

This is a quick and, fairly painless , procedure and if everyone makes sure to follow the steps it will make the church run more efficiently and insure we are being good stewards of our resources.



The children came to celebrate "The Birth of Jesus," with many angels, stars, shepherds, Wiseman, kings, narrators, and musicians.







BAZAAR 2017







approval already. But we are now looking for some help to reimburse the account. There is a board of



Because Jesus is the light of the world, his followers don't need to fear darkness or life's dark times. Make this nightlight to remind you of Jesus' light and presence.




What you need:

- Work area with good ventilation
- Mason jar
- Clear glue that works on glass
- Paintbrush
- Glass stones
- Tealight candle
- Lighter
- Adult supervision

What you do:

- 1. Starting at the top of the jar, brush glue on a small section.
- 2. Press glass stones onto the glue in rows. Let dry.
- 3. Continue gluing stones, in small sections, until the entire jar is covered.
- 4. When dry, place a candle inside. Light with adult help.


