# PASTOR'S MESSAGE

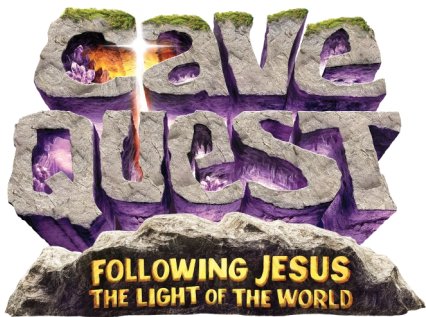

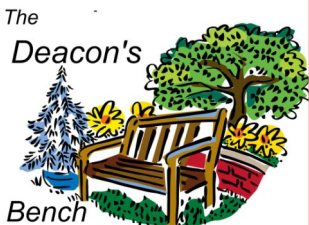

**Rendezvous in the Sault  
July 30—31, 2016**

Rendezvous in the Sault is a living history event that will take place along Historic Water Street at the City Hall Grounds and at the Historic Homes. In addition to local participants, over 115 visiting historical re-enactors, musicians, entertainers and merchants will set up camps and displays with presentations and demonstrations on military and civilian life in the period of 1668-1840. Food, music, dancing, cannon firing, drum and fife corps, puppet shows, storytelling, crafts and games will be just some of the fun things to see and do on Saturday and Sunday of the last full weekend of July. Among the many items of special interest are presentations by the Michigan Surveyor's Reenactment Group who will display early surveying equipment and maps and discuss the methods used to survey Michigan.

Continuing down Water Street to the Historic Homes of John and Susan Johnston, Henry Rowe Schoolcraft and Bishop Frederic Baraga, local Historical Society docents offer accounts of the lives of these early Sault residents. Spinning and weaving, music and animals, children's games, crafts and activities will be just some of the fun things to do.

Rendezvous in the Sault will be an annual event and is being presented by the Chippewa County Historical Society in cooperation with the City of Sault Ste. Marie. Planning and authenticity of encampments will be under the direction of the French Colonial Heritage Society of Port Huron, Michigan.

Our country was deeply divided between those who supported England and those who desired freedom, and the words, "Give me freedom or give me death!"

During the Revolutionary War Patrick Henry uttered these words and within a short time he became commander in chief of Virginia's first military force. He was a member of the Second Continental Congress. He helped draw up the first constitution of the commonwealth of Virginia and was primarily responsible for drawing up the amendments to our Constitution known as the Bill of Rights.

He became Virginia's first Governor and was re-elected 3 more times. He then retired from public life, but despite his strong objections the people went ahead and elected for the 5th time but he did not do as they wished and he refused to take the office.

He was offered a seat in the Senate, and posts as ambassador to Spain and to France. George Washington even asked him to be in his Cabinet and become Secretary of State and later wanted him to appoint him to the Supreme Court but he refused the recognition and honors

You may be wondering why I mention about Patrick Henry? It is because we need to realize he was an important man and respected leader in those days when our nation came into being.

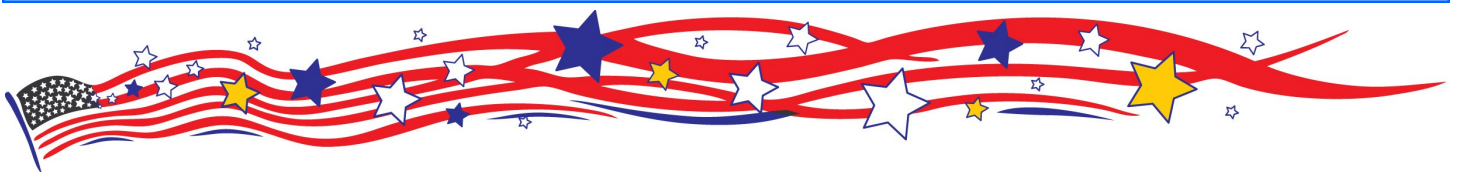
As a country we have to be free and Patrick Henry is the ideal example of being free to choose his life, but our cost of freedom is not free.

Of the 56 signers of the Declaration of Independence, few were long to survive. Five were captured by the British and tortured to death. Twelve had their homes looted, burned and destroyed by fire. Two signers had two sons in the Army were captured. Nine of the 56 died in the war from its hardships or from its more merciful bullets.

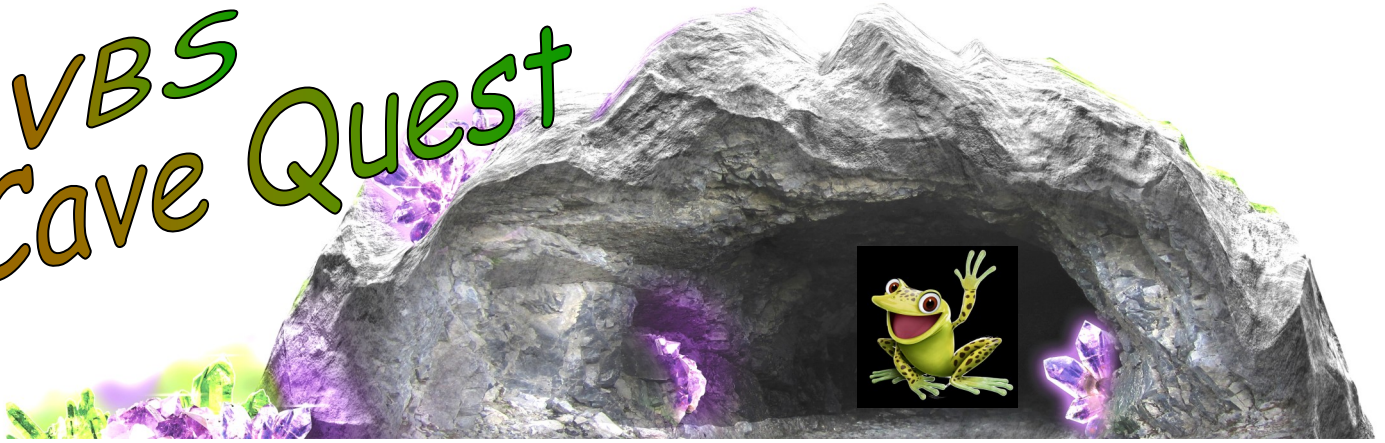
I don't know what impression you had of these men who met together that hot summer day in Philadelphia, but it is important for us to know they were not poor men, they weren't wild eye pirates. These men were wealthy prosperous land owners.

They considered our liberty as their sacred honor, and they paid the price because we have to be free in the good old USA

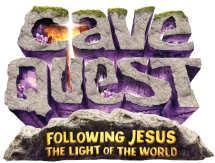

Children nine to sixteen will fish from 10am - 11am.

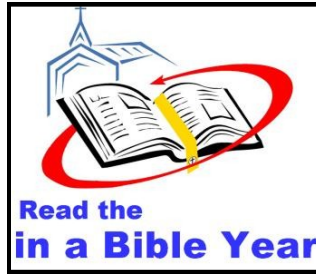
From 11am - 12pm, all registered children will be able to fish.

### What you do:

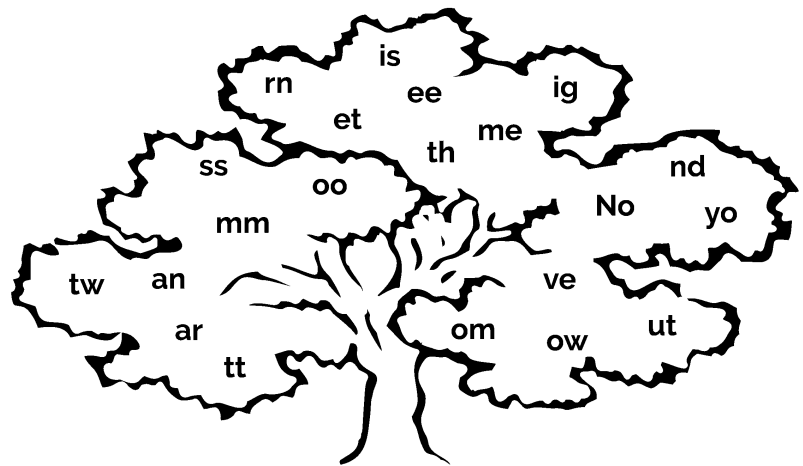
1. Cut the dough into slices 1/8-inch thick. Place slices on the pan, overlapping them slightly.





















