Saturday I was in the church setting up for Sunday. The setup was to show a five minute DVD for the Samarian's purse "Operation Christmas Child". At first I was not sure if we would show the DVD but upon viewing it and it being different than last year, I thought it would be fun. It might seem that such a setup would be an easy and straightforward process. This is exactly what I was thinking. It is funny how we forget. By the time I had found the screen, projector, cables, extension cords, card table and assembled it all about an hour had passed. I was thankful I was done, as I still had some work to do on my sermon for Sunday. I grabbed a DVD from our church library to test everything to make sure everything worked. After fiddling with the placement and settings on the projector to get the best picture I could, I tested the audio. I had audio but it sounded a little funny. This was a bit disturbing. Not so much for the DVD but if the main speakers were not functioning it would be very, very difficult for the congregation to hear any part of the service. This started me trouble shooting what could be the problem. Thanks

to Fred and Alicia's work there is a nice schematic in the sound cabinet to help know what the various buttons, gadgets and gizmos do. All of the buttons, gadgets and gizmos appeared to be set at the right valves. I was started to get annoyed. I had spent two hours and not only was the DVD not going to work, but the sound system seemed to have a problem and I still had hours of work on my sermon ahead of me.

As a side note, it is really hard to work on a sermon when one is agitated. I suddenly remembered I had plugged the audio cable into the # 8 microphone input. In the past we have had some troubles with that input. I switched it to port # 7 and amazingly everything worked. I should have rejoiced, but I was still agitated about spending two hours to get everything to work. I was also a little annoyed about remembering about the problems with microphone input #8 after about an hour of messing around with it. Don't you just hate that when your brain finally gives you a piece of information an hour, day or week late?

As the test DVD was running and now that all the speakers were working, I could not help but listen to the DVD. The test DVD I had chosen from our library was





Watch for our **Cookie Walk on December 13**<sup>th</sup> as we raise funds to replenish our food pantry. Donations of funds allow us to take advantage of bulk pricing of food from Feeding America. Canned goods such as fruit and meat items (stew, tuna, salmon, chicken, etc.) are in the greatest demand and more challenging to purchase.

The Bible tells us the spiritual fruits include love, peace, joy, kindness, patience, and goodness. The Deacons are the spiritual support team of the church. Please let us know if you would like a ride to church, a visit at the hospital, prayers, communion or other need of the spirit.



The first 3 years beginning in 1620, the Pilgrims had very sparse provisions and many died of starvation. At one time the Pilgrims had only five kernels of corn on their "Thanksgiving" plate. Each was asked to tell others at the dinner table the five things for which they are grateful. Maybe we today should go around the Thanksgiving table and let each family member recite 5 items for which they are thankful. We live at a time when it should be easy for each of us to recite our gratitude for all that we have been given by our God.

Pledge cards for the 2016 fiscal year have been sent to the membership. The completed cards will be used to confidentially post your 2016 pledge to your contribution account maintained by the Church. The security and

confidentiality of your information is taken very seriously and access is limited. Throughout the upcoming year you will receive quarterly reports of your contributions in relation to your pledge and a final statement will be sent after the end of the year for tax purposes.

The Trustees work hard to be good stewards of your financial support. The cost of operating and maintaining the Church includes employee payroll, employment related expenses, building operations and building maintenance. 2015 expenses and contributions are running very close to budget. What this means in a practical sense is that for that past several years we have cut expenses everywhere possible. We are down to basic operations. We thank our church family for your previous generosity but we need every church member to contemplate increasing your giving to grow our Church. It is due to your generous contributions that we are able to keep our doors open.

The 2016 per capita continues at \$35 per person. Consider including this extra amount with your pledge. Per capita is the amount our Church is expected to send to the Presbytery for each active member of the Church.

Members are urged to pray about your giving and to make a covenant with God. You should prayerfully pledge what your heart directs for God loves a cheerful giver!

## Thankful Hearts


Make table decorations that serve as Thanksgiving conversation-starters.

### What you need:

- Paper and pencil
- Scissors
- Cloth or felt
- Needle and thread
- Sewing machine (optional)
- Fiber fill, cotton balls or rice
- Adult help

## What you do:

- 1. Cut out a heart pattern (any size) on paper. Allow 1/4" for a seam if you'll be using a sewing machine.
- 2. Cut out material hearts, placing pieces right sides out if sewing by hand and right sides together if using a machine.
- 3. For hand-sewing, use a running stitch or an overcast stitch. Leave an opening for stuffing.
- 4. With a machine, sew along a 1/4" seam, allowing a 1" opening so you can turn the heart inside out and insert stuffing. Trim close to seam but don't cut stitching.
- 5. Fill with stuffing. Sew the opening shut by hand.
- 6. Put a heart at each place setting. Before dinner, have guests pick theirs up and say why they have a thankful heart.
