1 John 4 tells us "My dear friends don't believe everything you hear. Carefully weigh and examine what people tell you." This seems to be particularly appropriate as we enter the final stretch run of our presidential election. Every four years we go through a process that wears the country out and usually strains credulity. The Apostle John was, obviously, not referring to presidential elections. It does seem a good piece of advice to be cautious of claims we hear in our daily lives.

We are constantly bombarded by messages in our society. Commercials besiege us on TV, radio, the internet, etc. Advertisers are always thinking of creative ways to sell us on products that we are promised will make our lives better. Political messages are constantly targeting us with some "message". Such messages are always telling us we must "ACT NOW!"

The result of all of these targeted ads and messages is we can grow very cynical of what we hear. We tune out ads and political messages. Some of this is, no doubt, is necessary to maintain our

sanity. Cynicism definitely has a place in our lives. There is a potential downfall to this cynicism. In time we can add more and more things to the list of things we "tune out" in life. Eventually we can begin "tuning out" real human beings. If we hear a certain word or name, we can reflexively, tune that individual out. Upon hearing certain buzz or watch words, we simply assign them to a whole group we don't listen too.

John 13:34, ""A new command I give you: Love one another. As I have loved you, so you must love one another." Our Lord has command us to love one another. Not just the ones that agree with us. Not just the ones who view the world as we do. Our Lord commands us to love one another. Imagine if Jesus reserved his love for only those who agreed with him? How often would we forfeit the love of Jesus because our thought or actions are not pleasing to God?

Since Jesus did not command us to love a political party or consumer product, we are free to tune out any and



Donations of winter coats and other outerwear will be added to the rack of available items. The rack will be in the social hall to receive and give.

We are thankful to Family Fare (Spartan Foods) for their contribution to the food pantry. A two-week receipt campaign in early September raised \$1,000. Baskets will be prepared and distributed on a monthly basis. The first basket distribution will take place the week prior to

Thanksgiving. Please let us know of anyone who is in need so that we may add them to our list.

The deacons are looking for helping hands. Our ministry has many tasks. Perhaps one would fit in with your personal ministry. Activities include a monthly service at Freighter View the third Sunday of each month, sending cards to our shut-ins, get well, and thinking of you cards, greeting on Sundays and maintaining supplies in the pews. The food pantry needs a watchful eye to ensure emergency bags of food are available and the shelves are stocked, preparing food baskets and delivery. Our service of compassion also includes visiting those who need a smile and a lift to their day as well as members of our congregation who are in the hospital. As it has often been said, many hands make for light work.

Not all of us are aware of the needs within the congregation. We appreciate your continued support, letting us know when we can be of assistance.

Every single month holds its own importance in everybody's life. Some thankful for all that we have been granted by almighty God.


