# Church Treasure Lee Mason

Why is the First United Presbyterian Church of Sault Sainte Marie, Michigan Still Strong?

Greetings. I am continuing with a few articles about some of our "Church Treasures" or those members who have helped make our congregation vibrant and strong. Last month, Suzanne Stevenson recommended that I choose Lee Mason for my next article.

66 years ago, on March 10, 1957, while President Dwight D. Eisenhower was serving his second term, Sault Ste. Marie's Robert Mason and Bonnie Mason (nee Drews) brought Lee Arlan Mason into the world (see photo of his parents). Lee is the first member of our church that I have written about from the Baby Boomer generation. Lee has a sister, Brenda Napoletano living in Dafter, MI. Clearly a faithful Christian and a devoted family man, Lee brought in some family pictures and two Bibles. One of the Bibles was a lovely white one packaged in a beautiful finished wood enclosure that had belonged to his grandmother. (see photo of Bible below).





Lee grew up in the Soo. During his childhood, Lee attended church with his mother and grandmother at Bethel Church in Newberry, MI. He also has fond memories of attending the Presbyterian Community Chapel Sunday School. He brought in the Bible he received on Promotion

Sunday, Sept. 18,1966 (see photo right, of inscription in Bible). The Presbyterian Community Chapel was on Greenough Street just across from the Jefferson

school. It was opened in a former Methodist Mission building in 1926 but closed in 1981 due to the cost of upkeep. Lee remembers when his father helped build the addition to the Chapel and also remembers being taught by Mrs. Bumstead (superintendent), Mrs. Jacobson (Kay Boyne's mother), Mrs. Headley, and Mrs. Wilcox, among others. He remembers with sadness Rev. Kipp's leading the final service at the Chapel, but he loved the fact that a dedicated Chapel Service was continued at the Bingham Street church.



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Before graduating from Sault Ste Marie Area High School in 1975, Lee worked at the American Merchant Marine Library providing books for crews of ships. Lee mentioned that it is the only Merchant Marine library branch on the Great Lakes. After high school, Lee attended Lake Superior State University and earned his Bachelor's Degree in Environmental Science. After college, Lee worked in the Environmental Health Section of the Chippewa County Health Department for 33 years. After that he worked at Walmart for 10 more years before retiring.



Kristeen (nee) Barras and Lee Mason were married in our church in 1988 (see wedding photo). Interim pastor Rev. Nancy Tomlinson performed the ceremony. Gary Goetz was a groomsman at his wedding (see photo of

Gary and Lee) and his friend Jim Monroe was his best man. The Masons have two daughters, Jeanine and Sarah, and one son, Carl (named after his grandfather Carl). All three of the Mason children still live in the area. The Masons also have six grandchildren: Kalan, Killian, Callee, Corbin, Caden and Kristi. (Just imagine trying not to mix up names when those six grandchildren are in the same room!).



Lee and Kristeen taught together in our Sunday School for 17 years. He said they mainly taught 3rd, 4th and 5th grade students. Lee is an exemplary church member and is serving his fourth year as an Elder. Along with being a dedicated and involved member of our church, Lee loves to go camping with his family and enjoys building plastic model kits. Lee is cool and collected. I am sure there's more to tell and I gave him ample opportunity to brag (okay, actually I pushed and prodded him...) but that is not the Lee I know from Session. He is a soft-spoken, humble and circumspect individual. He is also a very nice man and we are grateful for his presence and example in our congregation.

Next month, per Lee's recommendation, I will try to write about another congregational treasure: Sara Jones.

reetings. While interviewing Suzanne Stevenson for the October Chimes article about our Church Treasures, Suzanne showed me a publication from our church called: "First Presbyterian Church: Church Building Canvass, Sault Ste. Marie, Michigan 1956." While reading it, I found out that the booklet was published at the time to solicit church and community support to build an

education unit with a goal of raising \$150,000.00 in pledges. There was ample insight into our church heritage, faith and focus. Reverend David McClean wrote an opening article along with many other members throughout the booklet. For me, the most interesting article of the book was about our congregational history. I decided that this would be a wonderful article to republish in the Chimes for our current congregation to enjoy. If it is too long for you to read it all, make sure you read at least the second to the last paragraph!

#### "Presbyterianism In Sault Ste Marie: A Historical Saga."

Our church has a fascinating and storied heritage. It began when Jeremiah Porter (pictured right), a divinity student at Princeton Theological Seminary, received a call to exploit the wilderness of the Northwest Territory in the name of the Kingdom of God in 1831 and it has continued down to the present day (1956). The history of our church has been colored by star-studded luminaries who left their mark on the picturesque past of Sault Ste Marie and the story of our great nation. Such names as John Johnston, Henry R. Schoolcraft, Robert Stuart, Rev. Abel Bingham, Rev. T. R. Easterday, Rev. James S. Kennedy and many others, make the past episode of our church read like an intriguing novel.



It was a real challenge to young Jeremiah Porter of Hadley, Massachusetts to make the quick transition from his ordination on Oct. 3, 1831 to traveling by mail stage to Albany, canal boat to Buffalo and passage on the last steamboat of the season to Mackinac Island. He began the last leg of his hazardous journey on Thanksgiving Day in an Indian canoe dispatched by Henry Schoolcraft, Indian Agent for this territory and was accompanied by three French-Indian paddlers. It was during his short stay on Mackinac Island with Robert Stuart, later a member of the Lewis and Clark Expedition, that the Rev. Porter first met Eliza Chappel who was destined to become his wife.

Several days after Thanksgiving had passed, the canoe rounded the turn of St. Mary's river



below the Rapids and Jeremiah Porter's eyes focused on a sight beautiful to behold. He was struck by the beauty of "Elmwood" (pictured left), a stately white house built after the best fashions of New England and knew instinctively that he was gazing at the home of Henry Schoolcraft and his wife Jane, daughter of John Johnston and Princess Neengai. It was in this comfortable home that he was to spend his first winter in this virgin territory. His keen eyes quickly picked out the buildings of Fort Brady and the Indian settlement with its orderly cluster of lodges at the foot of the Rapids.

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Through the able assistance of Mr. Schoolcraft and his cultured wife Jane, who spent much time in Europe in intellectual pursuit, the young Rev. Porter soon found himself ready to teach the Gospel of God to the Indians and white settlers alike. Except for sporadic missions by the Jesuits and the humble beginnings of Rev. Abel Bingham who came here in 1828 representing the American Baptist Missionary Society, this region was starving for spiritual food.

Rev. Bingham was most cooperative and offered to share his church and school, located on what is now the corner of Portage Avenue and Bingham with the Presbyterian minister, but Rev. Porter did not feel that this union would accomplish his true purpose. Through the grace of Jane Johnston Schoolcraft (pictured right), a vacant store building was fitted up and used for worship services. The church was actually organized in January 1832 with seven members and the elders elected were Henry R. Schoolcraft and Major deLafayette Wilcox, commandant of Fort Brady. To accommodate the increasing membership, a church with a tiny white stee-



ple was erected by Mrs. John Johnston, the former Princess Neengai, a full-blooded Chippewa Indian. While there is no written record of the exact location of this church, it appears to have been located in the approximate location of the present Pillar Community Building grounds. The church as remembered by later Sooites was the one located where the Polyclinic now (1956) stands and this was built and given as a gift to the congregation by Charles T. Harvey, builder of our famous Soo Locks. Once again the congregation outgrew its facilities and in 1902, the present structure was built.

In later years, outstanding names connected with our church were those of Rev. T. R. Easterday (pictured left), whose tenure was seventeen years and Rev. John VerStraate, (pictured right) who was with us for a quarter century. The devotion of these men was exemplified by the growth of the church until we once more find ourselves bursting at the seams and now under the able leadership of your present pastor, the Rev. David McClean, in need of expansion.

First Presbyterian Church of this city can well be proud of the fact that it was the mother of the First Presbyterian Church of Chicago. Much of the Fort (Brady) personnel was transferred to Chicago in 1833 and Rev. Porter, sensing the need for church organization there, went with them to Fort Dearborn. The nucleus of Chicago's vast Presbyterian empire was formed by officers and soldiers of the Sault church and had its humble beginning under our first pastor the Rev. Jeremiah Porter. Now we stand on the threshold of new era for our church. Already enriched by a poignant history and treasured tradition, we face a new challenge. CAN WE MEET IT? The author of the article above is uncertain but it sure is interesting, don't you agree?

## What does that mean?



"Hanging of the Greens" refers to the practice of adding evergreens (live or artificial) to a congregation's worship space. This is generally done either just before, or on, the first Sunday of Advent in preparation for Christmas. The history of decorating with winter

evergreens dates to Martin Luther's ministry in the early 1500's. Luther saw evergreens as a symbol of the unchanging nature of God. He encouraged people to decorate their homes and churches with evergreens during the Christmas season to symbolize everlasting life through Jesus Christ. Many churches began to celebrate the beginning of the Christmas season with a ceremonial "Hanging of the Greens." Sprays, garlands, wreaths, and trees were hung and displayed in conjunction with Advent, a time of expectant waiting in preparation of the celebration of Christ's birth. As a circle, the Advent wreath is a reminder of God who has no beginning or end. The wreath evergreens speak to the hope and renewal of eternal life. Candles symbolize Christ as the light of the world. Some churches do this event as part of a worship service, while others use it as a fellowship event. We do the latter, and we will be "Hanging the Greens" after the worship service on November 26th this year. We hope you can join in!

1,750 years ago Constantine 1 (the Great) was the first Roman emperor to embrace the Christian faith. He was most active in the Church. Constantine sought to heal divisions in the church. And to the life in the world to come. Amen


