PASTOR'S MESSAGE

We have a great God who deserves our praise and adoration. The Psalmists praises God, "(Psalm 100 NIV) A psalm. For giving thanks. Shout for joy to the LORD, all the earth. {2} Worship the LORD with gladness; come before him with joyful songs. {3} Know that the LORD is God. It is he who made us, and we are his ; we are his people, the sheep of his pasture. {4} Enter his gates with thanksgiving and his courts with praise; give thanks to him and praise his name. {5} For the LORD is good and his love endures forever; his faithfulness continues through all generations.

The history of the ancient Israelites is filled with moments of joyful worship in response to God's great actions. After God leads the Israelites out of Egypt is one such example, (Exo 15:1-6 NIV) Then Moses and the Israelites sang this song to the LORD: "I will sing to the LORD, for he is highly exalted. The horse and its rider he has hurled into the sea. {2} The LORD is my strength and my song; he has become my salvation. He is my God, and I will praise him, my father's God, and I will exalt him. {3} The LORD is a warrior; the LORD is his name. {4} Pharaoh's chariots and his army he has hurled into the sea. The best of Pharaoh's officers are drowned in the Red Sea. {5} The

deep waters have covered them; they sank to the depths like a stone. {6} "Your right hand, O LORD, was majestic in power. Your right hand, O LORD, shattered the enemy.

The disciples went to the Mount of Olives with Jesus and sang a hymn (Mark 14:26). Paul and Silas, although unjustly imprisoned, sang hymns to God (Acts 16:25). These are just some of the many Biblical examples of people who were moved by life's circumstances to praise God. We are entering the "High Holy Days" of the Christian year. We remember Jesus' final meal with his disciples. How Jesus before he left, gave them final teachings on love and service as well as instituting the Lord's Supper. As Christians we remember his betrayal and proclaim we are the betrayers. We meditate on Good Friday about his sufferings because they should be our sufferings. Then when all seemed lost, we remember the joy of that first Easter Morning when some women went to Jesus' tomb and found he was not dead, but ALIVE!

We have some much to rejoice and be glad about during these days. Let us come to the Lord's House and rejoice for as the scripture says, "(2 Cor 6:2 NIV) For he says,

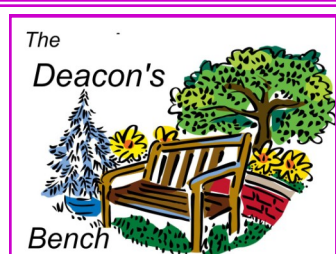

Please know that when you pay for your per capita, it goes directly to our churches per capita account. It does not go to our general fund or anywhere else in our budget. These dollars collected are important for the growth of our church and the support of our leaders. Please take a moment and read how your per capita dollars are spent.

- **Vocational matters;** providing support in identifying and developing leadership for the PC(USA) and the whole body of Christ through the Office of Vocation, preparation for ministry and ordination exams
- **Church Leadership Connection;** a Web-based matching and referral system for all Presbyterian church leaders
- **Presbyterian Historical Society;** collects, preserves, and shares information on American Presbyterianism; encourages appreciation of the church's heritage
- **Constitutional services;** maintains judicial and legislative services required by the PC(USA) Constitution; helps to interpret the Constitution

Create a simple yet powerful Easter display.







What you need:

- 3 wood blocks (small, medium, large)
- Acrylic paint (three pastel colors and white)
- Paintbrush
- Water
- Paper towels
- Letter stencils and tape (optional)

What you do:

1. Paint each block of wood a different pastel color. (You can paint the whole block or just one side.)
2. When paint is dry, use white paint to write (or stencil) “He” on the smallest block, “is” on the medium block and “risen!” on the large block.
3. When blocks are dry, stack them from largest to smallest to proclaim “He is risen!”
