Pastor's Message



Holy Week is a special time in the life of the Church. From the time of the early Church to today, the Church has engaged in activities to remind the faithful this week is set apart from any other.

To get technical, Holy Week is eight days rather than the traditional seven. It starts on Palm Sunday when the Church remembers Jesus riding into Jerusalem to fulfill prophecy about the Messiah.

Maundy Thursday is a commemoration of Jesus' last meal with his disciples. We remember Jesus instituting the Sacrament of Holy Communion, his body and blood shed for us. Jesus used this evening meal to give some of his most sacred teachings, such as the command of love to serve others. Maundy Thursday can end with an emphasis on Jesus' meal with the apostles or it can continue to encompass his suffering in the garden of Gethsemane. It was here that Jesus wrestled with the weight of the sins of the world. Some mystics have claimed the Gethsemane experience of Jesus was more trying than the events of Good Friday. They assert the pain of our sins wounded Jesus more deeply than the physical wounds of scourging and crucifixion.

Good Friday, also known as the Friday we call Good, marks Jesus' trial and crucifixion. Jesus is remembered for bearing his pain without complaint. On the cross, Jesus absolves us of our sin and even remembers the material needs of his mother in asking John to provide for her. John, in his Gospel, has

Jesus dying just as the Passover lambs are being slaughtered.

Good Friday was a crushing time for the disciples as they watched the one they love, and all their hopes, die before their eyes. Yet, we see God working even in this as Joseph of Arimathea completes prophecy by asking for Jesus' body, placing him in his tomb and, with the holy women, beginning the preparations for burial.

Easter Morning ends Holy Week. It begins with the holy women going to the tomb to finish Jesus' burial preparation that they had started before the Sabbath began. To their surprise he is not there and some Angels have some wonderful and startling news, he is not dead but alive!

We invite everyone to take part with us in the celebration of this week. We have a Maundy Thursday Service at 7:00pm. A potluck will proceed the service at 5:45pm.

The community Good Friday Service will be at the Central United Methodist Church on E Spruce St at 1:00pm.








Our next meeting is **April 18, 2023 at 12:00 noon.** Bring your lunch and lots of ideas. Dessert is always provided.







Why Does Our Church Have a Cottage on Sugar Island?




If you look online at the website for our congregation (www.soopresbyterian.org) and click on the third pull-down menu labeled "Items of Interest", the 4th selection down on the menu is "Retreat Cottage". Going to that webpage will provide you with some more detailed information about the cottage. But how did it come to be and why does the church own it?

The cottage is actually built from wood that was salvaged

from the Presbyterian wood stave church built on the corner of Maple and Court Streets (the location of the present day Court House Annex). The wood church was completed in 1854 by the church members and the Harvey Construction Company (builder of the first lock in the Soo Locks). As a result, the church building has been referred to as the "Harvey" church. When the first Bingham Street church was dedicated in 1903, the Harvey church was effectively left empty and abandoned.



In 1911 Rev. Kennedy and another member, Jay Sutton, purchased the church building from the Harvey company. The church was subsequently torn down and the salvaged wood was sent by barge to Sugar Island where the Kennedy family built



two cottages with it. Mark Kennedy, the grandson of Rev. Kennedy, donated the cottage to the church in 2008 after his brother passed away. This gift to the church was in keeping with the brothers plans. Mark Kennedy still owns the 2nd cottage that is next door; just north of the Retreat Cottage.

As you can see, the cottage is rich in church history.

The Retreat Cottage is a lovely place for a getaway and the plans to make some improvements should only make it better.

Spiral Letter


