PASTOR'S MESSAGE

The Lord's Prayer has been at the heart of Christian worship and prayer since the earliest days of Christianity. Given the Lord's Prayers importance in Christian worship, I have been asked over the years why the version we recite is different than what is found in scripture. There do seem to be some differences, "(Luke 11:2-4 NIV) He said to them, "When you pray, say: "Father, hallowed be your name, your kingdom come. {3} Give us each day our daily bread. {4} Forgive us our sins, for we also forgive everyone who sins against us. And lead us not into temptation." This version does not contain "who art in heaven", "thy will be done on earth as it is in heaven", "deliver us from evil" and the closing doxology "for thine is the kingdom and the power and the glory forever amen". There are many similarities, but also some stark differences between the version of The Lord's Prayer in Luke and the one we recite in worship.

The Gospel of Matthew also contains a version of The Lord's Prayer, (Mat 6:9-13 NIV) "This, then, is how you should pray: "Our Father in heaven, hallowed be your name, {10} your kingdom come, your will be done on earth as it is in heaven. {11} Give us today our daily bread.

{12} Forgive us our debts, as we also have forgiven our debtors. {13} And lead us not into temptation, but deliver us from the evil one." This version of The Lord's Prayer is very close to the one we recite lacking only the ending doxology, "for thine is the kingdom and the power and the glory for ever amen". So why is there a difference in versions of The Lord's Prayer within the Gospels?

The Gospel of Luke is not an eye witness account of Jesus and his teaching. Luke specifically tells us his Gospel is written after speaking with eye witnesses to Jesus. The Gospel of Matthew is an eye witness account to Jesus and his teachings. Matthew was also written at a later date. Matthew's version of The Lord's Prayer is probably Matthew's way of politely correcting Luke in his account. It is no surprise we use a version closer to Matthew' than Luke's.

Our version of The Lord's Prayer is still different than Matthew's version by including the ending doxology, "for thine is the kingdom and the glory and the power forever amen". There is an ancient Christian document called the Didache. Didache is a transliteration of a Greek word which means

“teaching”. We know the Didache existed in 95 AD and possibly even earlier in 70’s AD. It claims to be teachings of the twelve apostles. It was accepted and recognized as authoritative in the early Christian Church. The version of The Lord’s Prayer found in the Didache is the one we use today.

When we recite The Lord’s Prayer either collectively or individually, we are praying a prayer that was widespread in the early Christian Church. In using this prayer we are joining countless Christians over the course of two thousand years. How amazing is that?

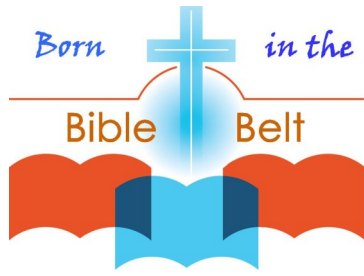


Pastor Mark is going to be starting up a new members class in the near future. If

Tulsa, Oklahoma is the birth place of Don who remembers World War 2 vividly. In grade school he recalls purchasing a 10 cent stamp for a war bond book on a weekly basis. The booklet cost \$18.75 and was worth \$25.00 nine years later. He collected tin cans and newspapers and placed them on the scrap pile to be used in the war effort. Pearl Harbor is a day that he will never forget.

As he grew up he was as athletic as most boys in the neighborhood and after finishing high school he attended the University of Tulsa on a baseball scholarship. He was a catcher from the time he was 10 until he was 21. During the summers, he was a Roustabout in the Gulf of Mexico for 3 years and near Tulsa for 2 years.

He married his college sweetheart, Marilyn in 1956. They reared 4 children, a son who lives in St. Louis, MO. and a daughter who resides in Chandler, AZ and another two daughters living on Bainbridge Island, WA. Combined they have 8 grand children, and 2 great grand children.

Over the years Don distinguished himself by becoming a finalist in a series of Toastmasters speech contests, an accredited rose judge and exhibitor with the American Rose Society and the Rose Society of England. He became a District Governor of Lions International, was Coach of the year in Detroit's Catholic League and Coach of the Year

in Sault Ste. Marie in the Great Lakes Inter Collegiate Athletic Conference all in softball.

After purchasing a home on Drummond Island in 1977, they eventually moved there in 1984 when he and Marilyn retired there after Republic Steel merged with another company. While living on Drummond until 2003, they traveled extensively and wherever the International Convention was held he was the Chairman of the Lions of MI All State Band. On behalf of Lions they visited, South Korea, China, Japan, Hong Kong, England, Scotland, France, the Azores, Iceland, Canada, Mexico, Puerto Rico, New Zealand, Spain, Morocco, Hawaii, and Australia.

Don has served the Presbytery and the First United Presbyterian Church under 3 ministers.

Today, Don and Marilyn and Abby my kayak companion are your neighbors in the Sault and they live in a condo located just east of the power canal on the St. Mary's River.

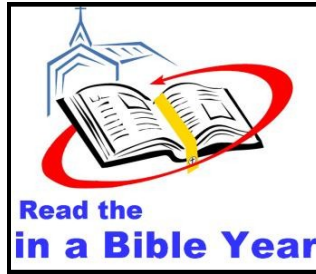


The Textile Social Group has already begun to set their mission goal for 2017.

We have started lap quilts for next season, among other items and we continue to accept denim and other fabric donations.

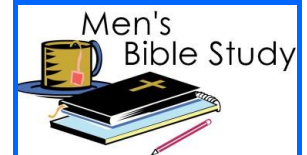

We do charge a nominal usage fee to keep operating expenses covered. Call today and see what time slots are available.

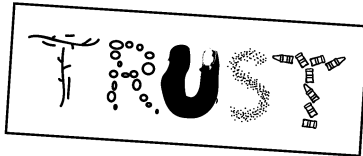

No matter what you face, God is with you. Make this poster as a reminder to always trust God.

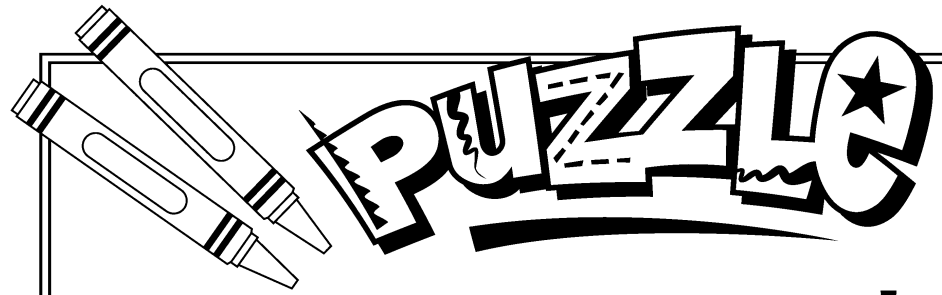


What you need:

- Cardstock
- Glue
- Twigs (a 3" piece and a 2" piece)
- Pebbles
- Black paint
- Paintbrush
- Sand or glitter
- Broken crayons (2 or 3)

What you do:

1. On the left side of the cardstock, trace a 3"-high letter T with glue. Place twigs on the glue lines.
2. Trace an R of the same size. Place pebbles on that glue.
3. Use black paint to make a U.
4. Trace an S in glue. Pour sand (or glitter) on top.
5. Make another T with glue. Place the crayons on top.
6. After the poster dries, shake off the excess sand (or glitter) into a trash can.
