PASTOR'S MESSAGE

Can you believe it? December is here!!!! The Holiday Season is when we make special plans with friends and family. It is also a time we as a church family make special plans. The Advent and Christmas season is the time we celebrate the entrance of our Lord in flesh. Isaiah gives us a prophecy about this blessed event in Isaiah chapter 7:14. The historical situation takes place in 743 BC. Ahaz the king of Judah hears that Syria and the northern kingdom Israel are joining forces against him and his kingdom. He believes Judah is doomed and can't stand against this alliance. God sends word by Isaiah to have faith. Due to Ahaz's lack of faith he does not ask a sign of God even though God implores him to ask. In his consternation over Ahaz's lack of faith, Isaiah delivers the prophecy about God's entrance in the flesh.

(Isa 7:1-14 NIV) "When Ahaz son of Jotham, the son of Uzziah, was king of Judah, King Rezin of Aram and Pekah son of Remaliah king of Israel marched up to fight against Jerusalem, but they could not overpower it. {2} Now the house of David was told, "Aram has allied itself with Ephraim"; so the hearts of Ahaz and his people were shaken, as the trees of the forest are shaken by the wind. {3} Then the LORD

said to Isaiah, "Go out, you and your son Shear-Jashub, to meet Ahaz at the end of the aqueduct of the Upper Pool, on the road to the Washerman's Field. {4} Say to him, 'Be careful, keep calm and don't be afraid. Do not lose heart because of these two smoldering stubs of firewood--because of the fierce anger of Rezin and Aram and of the son of Remaliah. {5} Aram, Ephraim and Remaliah's son have plotted your ruin, saying, {6} "Let us invade Judah; let us tear it apart and divide it among ourselves, and make the son of Tabeel king over it." {7} Yet this is what the Sovereign LORD says: "It will not take place, it will not happen, {8} for the head of Aram is Damascus, and the head of Damascus is only Rezin. Within sixty-five years Ephraim will be too shattered to be a people. {9} The head of Ephraim is Samaria, and the head of Samaria is only Remaliah's son. If you do not stand firm in your faith, you will not stand at all." {10} Again the LORD spoke to Ahaz, {11} "Ask the LORD your God for a sign, whether in the deepest depths or in the highest heights." {12} But Ahaz said, "I will not ask; I will not put the LORD to the test." {13} Then Isaiah said, "Hear now, you house of David! Is it not enough to try the patience of men? Will you try the patience of

Food Safety: The use of gloves for ready to eat foods

Many ready to eat foods are served in our church kitchen. Ready to eat foods are defined as foods that will require no cooking or no further cooking prior to being served to the consumer (sandwiches, cookies, cake, crackers, etc).

The Michigan Food Code requires that after thorough hand washing at the kitchen hand washing station, food handler gloves must be worn whenever handling ready to eat foods.

The main reason for not touching ready to eat foods with bare hands is to prevent viruses and bacteria, which can be present on a food worker's hands, from contaminating food.

Contamination of food by unclean hands has been shown to be one of the leading causes of food borne illness.

Ready to eat foods can also be handled with forks, tongs, spatulas etc.

Some important things to remember about the use of food handler gloves:

- 1. Gloves are not a substitute for thorough hand washing. Hands must always be washed prior to wearing gloves or changing gloves.
- 2. Gloves need to be changed frequently especially after any interruption of the work routine or the touching of any item that could possibly contaminate the gloves.

Properly using food handler gloves as required, is one way we can all ensure food safety when we work in the kitchen.

Many years ago when our 4 children were born we celebrated Christmas like most people with gifts hidden away until they were asleep on Christmas Eve and we hurried to place an equal amount of

toys and gifts under the Christmas tree. Then when Christmas day arrived the kids still dressed in their pajamas opened their presents and as parents we let them believe that Santa provided each and every gift

Between our dog and our kids we enjoyed the day with turkey and dressing, cranberries, apple cider, and all that went with the meal. The meal was even enjoyed for several days later. This is what we thought Christmas was all about.

Actually Christmas can arrive when we least expect it, sometimes in the most unexpected manner. Dr. James Dobson relates a story of an elderly lady who was struggling with her first Christmas alone. Her husband had died just a few months before due to a slow developing cancer. Now, several days before Christmas a brutal snow storm hit the area and she felt very much alone-that she wasn't going to decorate for Christmas.

Late that afternoon the door bell rang, and there stood a delivery boy with a box. He asked the lady to sign for the box. It was so cold the lady asked the delivery boy to step inside as she signed for the box. She then asked the boy, "What's in the box," and he opened the flap and inside was a puppy, a Golden Labrador Retriever. The delivery boy picked up the squirming puppy and explained, "This is for you, Ma'am, he is 6 weeks old, completely housebroken." The

Many years ago when young puppy began to wiggle in happiness our 4 children were for being released from captivity.

"Who sent this the lady asked?"

The young man set the animal down and handed her an envelope and said "It is all explained in this envelope, Ma'am. The dog was bought last July while its Mother was pregnant. It was meant to be a Christmas gift to you. The young man handed her a book on how to care for her Labrador Retriever.

She opened up the letter from husband. He had written it 3 weeks before he died and left it with the kennel owners to be delivered with the puppy as his last Christmas gift to her. The letter was full of love and encouragement and admonishments to be strong. He vowed that he was waiting for the day when she would join him. He had sent this young dog to be with her as his last Christmas gift to her. She wiped away the tears, put the paper down remembering the puppy at her feet, she picked up that golden furry ball and held it to her neck. Then she looked out the window at the lights that outlined the neighbor's house, and she heard from the radio strains of "Joy to the world". The lady for the first time felt an amazing sensation of peace washing over her. Her heart felt a joy and a wonder greater that her grief and loneliness.

"Little fella," she said to the dog. "It's just you and me now, but you know what, there is a box in the basement that has a Christmas tree in it and some decorations and lights, and a manger scene that will impress you, so let's go and get it and surround ourselves and keep Christmas in our lives and hearts forever."








DEACONS' WINTER CLOTHING DRIVE




What you need:

- Microwave-safe bowl
- Spoon or spatula
- 2 Tbsp. shortening
- Baking tray lined with wax paper
- Red and green M&M's (or sprinkles)

What you do:

- 1. Lightly spray bowl and wax paper.
- 2. Microwave chocolate chips in bowl for one-minute intervals until chocolate is melted. (Stir after each minute.)
- 3. Stir in shortening. Heat in 10-second intervals, stirring until smooth.
- 4. Pour chocolate onto tray and firmly press in M&M's or sprinkles.
- 5. Refrigerate until firm. Remove bark and break into pieces.
