- Foam letters or letter stickers
- White painting canvas
- Acrylic paints
- Paintbrush or sponge
- Water

What you do:


- 1. Place letters on the canvas to spell out the "ones" in Ephesians 4:4-6 (one body, one Spirit, one hope, one Lord, one faith, one baptism, one God).
- 2. Paint over the letters, using various colors.
- 3. When the paint is dry, peel off the letters to reveal words that explain important Bible truths.
- 4. If desired, finish by painting some number 1's in any blank spots.
