If we put our faith and trust in humans, movements and organizations we risk being swept away with them. When the tree is full, we will retrieve items and distribute them. Depending on donations, we hope to "empty the tree" several times during the winter season. Past recipients have included our local schools as well as families associated with the Community Action Agency.








January Mission Project


