Pastor's Message

The 4th of July is a sacred time for our country. It is a time we remember the founding of our country as it chartered a new direction not only for this nation but for the world. Our founding documents, the Constitution and Bill of Rights set forth principles of freedom and liberty for its citizens. Unfortunately, these rights and privileges did not extend to all individuals at first. It is an understandable and yet unfortunate reality given the period of time the founding fathers lived. These are discussions best left for other times as we choose to embrace what is good about July 4^{th} .

The First Amendment of the Bill of Rights gives us the freedom, among other things, to meet together and worship freely. This has been a right Americans have enjoyed throughout the history of this country. It was a right many would have believed would never have been abridged. And yet we have seen that happen in this last year. When the pandemic first started the government asked churches to close. Most churches did just that including our local congregation. It was a decision both boards of our church agreed too. We didn't know how COVID spread and it was a prudent decision to make.

Some governors of states, including our own, were not satisfied with the voluntary participation of the churches. They sought to use their emergency powers to make it illegal for people to meet and worship. I was a bit uneasy about this, but given how we didn't know how COVID spread I gave the governors who were doing this the benefit of the doubt. Some churches brought legal challenges to these forced shutdowns such as in our state. The judges in our state agreed with the plaintiffs; if a governor allows abortion clinics, liquor stores, and certain retail stores to remain open than the governor can't abridge citizen's first amendment rights to corporate worship. Judges in other states disagreed and allowed their respective governors to shut down churches while other businesses remained open. The United States Supreme Court would eventually settle the dispute in favor of the freedom to worship.

In time we started learning things about COVID. Data started becoming available that churches were not the super spreader environments many worried they would be. Churches could take precautions the same way other businesses did. In many states, however, governors continued to make it illegal to meet to worship. Even in the face of the decision of the Supreme Court they respective used their states health departments to multiply the requirements for churches making it practically impossible to meet. At the same time the governors who were forbidding worship allowed protests to gather in greater numbers and chanted





Where do we go from here and will our rights to worship be abridged again? I don't know. One thing I know is no matter what happens we have a promise from Jesus in John 14:27-28, "Peace I leave with you, my peace I give to you. I do not give to you as the world gives. Do not let your hearts be trouble, neither let them be afraid." If we allow the Spirit to dwell in us, this promise can indeed be ours no matter what the future holds.






July Mission Projects



What you need:



- Tables, chairs, pillows
- Painter's tape

What you do:

Players line up behind the Leader, who moves around in various ways. Followers must copy the Leader's movements faithfully. Try these variations:

- 1. Players must balance a bean bag on their head as they follow the Leader.
- 2. Set up an obstacle course, and follow the Leader by crawling under tables and chairs, hopping over pillows and so on.
- 3. With tape, make zigzags and curves on the floor. Then follow the Leader as if walking on a tightrope.
- 4. The Leader designates types of terrain to imagine, such as mud, snow, ice and a mountain.
- 5. Also try animal movements, mirrored movements and dancing movements.
