Pastor's Message

And so it begins.....the season of Lent. Lent is a 40 day period (excluding Sundays) that spans Ash Wednesday until Easter. Historically, this is a time for the faithful to prepare for the joys of Easter. To truly receive the good news of Easter, Christianity has always seen the necessity of preparing for the Holy Day. Easter Day is the gospel shrunk down to a single event and day. There is no Christianity without the empty tomb of Easter. Lent is the Church's way of making sure we don't miss the immeasurable grace of that day. Why are the Sundays of Lent excluded from the count of 40 days? The Church has always recognized each Sunday as a mini-Easter and as such stands beside the preparation for receiving Easter.

There are many ways to prepare for Easter. Some of these, fasting and self-denial, are not exactly the strong suit of Presbyterians. Presbyterians are far more likely to adhere to Paul's statement, 1 Cor 8:8 "But food does not bring us near to God; we are no worse if we do not eat, and no better if we do." It is a historic part of the Presbyterian tradition to take part in some of the other themes of Lent. Lent is a time when we engage in repentance. It is a time to engage in a spiritual evaluation. Are there areas of our life we are living outside the commands of God? Are we engaging in behavior our Lord would frown upon? Are there areas we can do better in? Lent is a time to remember to get back to the fundamental teachings our Lord has given us for our life.

A second theme in Lent that is part of the Presbyterian tradition is prayer. Lent is a time when we rededicate ourselves to prayer. Paul instructs us, 1 Th 5:16-19 "Be joyful always; {17} pray continually; {18} give thanks in all circumstances, for this is God's will for you in Christ Jesus. {19} Do not put out the Spirit's fire;" Pray constantly, it is a command we have been given. Lent is a time when we remember this command and try to exercise the spiritual discipline of prayer in our lives.

What Does That Mean?

Communion Table

Referred to as an altar in many churches, it is the table in the chancel that the clergy uses for Communion. During the Protestant Reformation, some people felt that the traditional term of "altar" was theologically misleading. As a result, many people preferred to call it a Communion Table. Anglicans decided that both terms were correct because it is the altar from which we receive the sacrifice of Jesus Christ, and because it is, literally, the table on which we celebrate Communion. Today, Anglicans and Lutherans generally call it the altar, while churches in the Reformed tradition tend to call it a Communion Table.



Alegra Soorus

Alegra Soorus is a serious person and not prone to frivolous things. She likes things done a certain way and it is difficult to stay in her good graces unless you can meet her fastidious expectations. But If you need something done with attention to detail and quality, put Alegra in charge. She had a loving but rigorous upbringing and, as is true with all of us, her life has been influenced by her extraordinary and remarkable life journey.

Alegra's parents were Francis Eunson and Edith Curran. Let's be clear, Eunson is a Scottish name and it is pronounced "Unson". Alegra's ancestry is from the Orkney Islands archipelago north of Scotland. Both of her parents were born in 1918, the year that World War I ended (22 million deaths) and the year that the Spanish Flu began (eventual 50 million deaths.) Her older brother was born in 1941 (he has passed away) and her younger sister Dorothea was born in 1951 and now lives in Knoxville, TN.

August 25, 1943 is the day Nazi Germany imposed a 72 hour work week in occupied territories and the day Alegra Soorus (nee Eunson) was born in Saco, Maine. Saco is a beautiful coastal town on the Atlantic seaboard about 95 miles north of Boston and 12 miles north of the George H.W. Bush summer home in Kennebunkport, Maine.

When Alegra was born, Saco was a bustling textile industry town but after most textile manufacturing moved south to the Carolinas the town diminished to around 20,000 people and has defense contracting businesses today. Alegra's father worked in the shipyards and eventually became a contractor. Alegra's parents divorced when she was young and she was raised by her aunts (that's pronounced "ahh -nts"...NOT ants...!) She grew up in the family 14 room home-

stead in town. She attended the prestigious Thornton Academy until she graduated. She did not say this, but I am sure this school was strict and rigorous and helped Alegra flourish into the focused and disciplined person we know.

Alegra attended The First United Baptist Church as a child, and sometimes she walked to church to maintain her PERFECT ATTENDANCE (I added the capital letters). She only added emphasis when she said, "Northern Baptist and American Baptist Conventions- --NOT Southern Baptist!

A day after our interview I received an email from Alegra which I will copy and paste:

"Good Morning Tom,

I forgot two items yesterday. First, I was baptized by full immersion at age 12. That is the Baptist way. You are dedicated as a baby and baptized when you are ready and know what you are doing. Second, I am named after Henry Wadsworth Longfellow's poem "The Children's Hour." Longfellow was from Portland, Maine and I think his home is still an Historical sight in Portland.

My Grandmother filled out my birth certificate and used only one L in my name. Just more trivia.

During our interview, my personal observation was that Alegra enjoyed her childhood. I say this because she was glowing when she spoke of making her aunt read Longfellow's poem to her night after night before bedtime. Alegra's joy in speaking about the poem made me go find it and read it. It is a lovely tribute to the love a parent feels for children. Henry Wadsworth Longfellow's poem, "The Children's Hour" was not familiar to me before our interview but I am sure that many of you are familiar with his poem, "The Song of Hiawatha", about an Ojibwe warrior named Hiawatha and the tragedy of his love for Minnehaha, a Dakota woman. The story takes place in the Pictured Rocks area of Lake Superior.

Sorry for the digression, let's get back to Alegra. After graduating from Thornton Academy, Alegra attended Westbrook College in Portland, Maine. She graduated with an Associate of Science degree in Secretarial Studies. Westbrook College became co-educational in 1973 and merged with the University of New England in 1996.

While attending college, Alegra took and passed the Civil Service Exam. At the age of 19, she moved to Washington, D.C. and was hired by the Commerce Dept. to work with the Bureau of the Census doing what she referred to as "early computer work". She did that for 5 years and then in 1968 was hired by the Air Force Data System Design Center in Washington, D.C. There was much civil unrest at the time with riots and bomb threats and in 1970 the Air Force decided to move everyone to Gunter Air Force Base (now renamed as the Gunter Annex of Maxwell Air Force Base) near Montgomery, Alabama.

In Washington D.C. she met Donner Dowd, an Air Force captain, originally from Rudyard, MI. and also a part of AFDSDC. They were mar-

ried at the Base Chapel in Alabama a year after they met. Kimberly Dowd (Vincek) was born in 1973. Kimberly is the mother of son Skyler and she works for the Department of Health & Human Services (DHHS) in Cassopolis, Michigan and resides in Dowagiac. Skyler is now 16 and he is in training to be one of the Varsity quarterbacks for Dowagiac High School (see picture).

In 1974, Alegra and Donner were transferred to Offutt Air Force Base, Strategic Air Command (SAC) headquarters in Omaha, Nebraska. There, in 1975, they were blessed with twin daughters, Kathryn and Kelly. Kathryn Dowd lives here in the Soo and owns Sault Realism Art Gallery on Portage Ave. Her twin sister Kelly Dowd lives in Kinross and, like her older sister Kimberly, she works for the Department of Health & Human Services (DHHS) in the Sault. Kelly's daughter Jordyn (see picture) is 16 and plays volleyball for Rudyard High School. The photo Alegra included of her three daughters together, shown left to right, Kathryn-Kimberly-Kelly is on the 1st page of this article.

The family eventually transferred to West Point, New York where Donner (now a Lieutenant Colonel) became an Exchange Officer at the United States Military Academy. While there, they sponsored 4 cadets.

The family would do anything from playing Old Maid cards or doing gymnastics to learning to ski.

Donner retired in 1982 and they moved to Sault Ste Marie and purchased the "Doc Webster" house at 408 Dillon. They visited his parents in Rudyard on weekends and joined FUPC where Donner sang in the choir, Alegra joined PW, and the girls attended Sunday School until they graduated high school.

Alegra "dipped her toes in the water" through the years by teaching Sunday School for 3-year olds, being on the Anchor House board of directors at LSSU, 2 terms on Session, 1 term on Trustees, was involved with lunches for weddings and local service for Presbyterian Women, and buying supplies for the church kitchen. Then, in her spare time, while raising three daughters, she decided that Sault Ste. Marie needed to have some Girl Scout troops. She learned and then provided Camp training and went from 4 to 15 troops in 1 year. She then found time to become a ParaPro/Teacher's Aide for remedial Math and Reading. Okay, she doesn't dip her toes…she swims in deep waters!

Then she turned 50. A traumatic year. There were school budget cutbacks and she lost her job, her oldest daughter was in college, and twin daughters were graduating and getting ready to go to college. Then

Donner left. But God stayed with her and her church family was

supportive. She had previously seen an opportunity to invest in the house next door and that became a viable choice. Then her job had funding again and she was called back. Then she saw an advertisement for USDA Rural Development Loans for Elderly and Low Income people. She

interviewed for the job and was hired the same day.

One day in 2003, while walking the track at the Big Bear Sports Arena she met a Vietnam veteran named Jim Soorus and on December 13th they were married with Rev. Dave Henderson officiating. Two years later, Alegra retired and they had 8 more wonderful years before the effects of Agent Orange took Jim away from her. Alegra truly enjoys her daughters, her

grandchildren and her church. Life is good.

Our beloved Alegra does not need introduction. But when you see her, share your smile and nod your head in thanks. Thank you Alegra. You are definitely FUPC royalty.






