# PASTOR'S MESSAGE

The week prior to the final Sunday in February was a very busy week for our church. We had a church cleaning day on Monday, followed by a joint meeting of Session, Trustees and Deacons that night. The next day we had a funeral service and luncheon that included pie. Wednesday we had a potluck with pie that was followed by the Ash Wednesday service. Thursday and Friday were spent getting ready for the Presbytery meeting on Saturday. Some of the Presbytery committees needed the church on Friday as they were meeting before the Presbytery meeting on Saturday. The Presbytery meeting itself required preparations before and after the meeting; some workers arriving at 7:30 in the morning and others not leaving until 4:30 in the afternoon due to preparations for Sunday.

All in all, it was a dizzying amount of work by many people. The work made possible a funeral service with luncheon, a fun potluck and meaningful Ash Wednesday service, a clean church for Presbytery committees to meet and the entire Presbytery to meet, a service of commissioning for Brenda, and a worship service with communion on Sunday. I want to thank all those who worked hard to make all these things possible. It is written in Ecclesiastes 4:9-12, "Two are better than one, because they have a good reward for their toil. For if they fall, one will lift up the other; but woe to one who is alone and falls and does not have another to help. Again, if two lie together, they keep warm; but how can one keep warm alone? ### What you need:


- White index cards (at least six)

## What you do:


- 1. On each card, write a group of people to pray for (family members, friends, teachers, sick people, etc.). Use a different color of writing utensil for each card.
