The other day as I thought with school starting soon, fall is not far away. Church attendance usually picks up when school starts. This is especially true for kids who have school commitments. The Bible tells us how important religious education is and especially for kids, "(Prov 22:5-6 NIV) In the paths of the wicked lie thorns and snares, but he who guards his soul stays far from them. {6} Train a child in the way he should go, and when he is old, he will not turn from it."

Life contains many pitfalls, having the wisdom to make good choices in life is important. Those with less life experience are generally more prone to make decisions which are not in their best interest. There are two ways of attaining wisdom, through learning from one's mistakes and listening to the wisdom of others. Clearly the preferred method is listening to the wisdom of others as it enables one to make good decisions without the bumps, bruises and consequences of making poor decisions.

Years ago, when we were in Estherville, I was having a discussion with an education professional who was an active member in the congregation. She informed me that studies indicated children who professed faith had the same rate of making potentially self-destructive decisions as those without any faith. I responded that there are several studies that indicate just the opposite. She expressed distrust at the studies that contradicted the ones she had seen. I told her that all the studies were correct. She asked me, "How can they all be true?"

I told her it was all a matter of how you measured "Faith". There was a correlation between having an active faith and better choices in life. The positive effect comes at a cost. The cost is spending one's time and priorities on faith. For those whose faith was a priority and who spent weekly time in their faith, on average made better choices. For those who professed faith, but it was not a priority in their lives, not surprisingly, their faith had little impact on their choices.


We have the promise in the Gospel of John, "(John 14:5-6 NIV) Thomas said to him, "Lord, we don't know where you are going, so how can we know the way?" {6} Jesus answered, "I am the way and the truth and the life..." A devotion to Jesus will lead to better choices in life. Living by his teachings will bring more satisfaction in life. Emulating Jesus' values in life, allows an individual to enjoy more of the important things in life. Training a child to be devoted to Jesus yields a world of good throughout life. Training in anything requires time, effort and patience. Will we give the gift to our kids of such training?







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More about the Trustees:

When thinking about what the Trustees do my mind turned to the somewhat controversial subject of Per Capita payments. It's sometimes called the Presbyterian tax. When I first started working on the Trustees and Session it was the position of the governing bodies that we would pay this tax in full every year. It was budgeted for even though we had some pretty skinny years we always paid in full.

Per capita was first mentioned in a letter to ministers in 1734 so it's been around a long time.

Because every Presbyterian shares in the benefit of the PC(USA) 's system of government, the expenses associated with coordinating and performing the functions of that system should be shared by everyone as well. Although per capita is not mandated per the constitution the constitution does not have a provision that allows the congregation i.e. session to withhold per capita as a form of protest. (per pcusa.org)

In the last years this has changed and our Church only remits what it collects leaving us with a high deficit within the Presbytery even though we are one of the bigger churches. This may technically be allowed but consider how the larger church has supported us particularly when the church was destroyed. Many of our fellow Presbyterian's gave us generous support. The Church offers many resources should we choose to take advantage of them.

Currently our per capita assessment is \$39.00 per member one of many reasons to keep our active membership rolls accurately. The apportionment is as follows:

Presbytery of Mackinac \$25.90

General Assembly \$9.85

Synod \$3.25

It's not to late to pay per capita this year. Please consider it prayfully.









Why is the First United Presbyterian Church of Sault Sainte Marie, Michigan Still Strong?

Greetings. We spent the last few months discussing church organization. I thought it might be nice to run a few articles on our "Church Treasures." This is what I choose to call those members who have kept our congregation vibrant and strong. I decided that I would choose Leitha Vollick for my first interview and at the end of each interview over the next few months I will let the person/treasure being interviewed choose the next treasure to be interviewed for the following month.

When my wife Loren and I joined the church choir early last year, we both greatly enjoyed getting to know long time choir member Leitha Vollick. Those days in Sault Ste Marie were highlighted by the pride in our local indigenous Olympic star Abby Roque and so the fact that Leitha was also a local pioneer in Women's Hockey was mentioned frequently. The first nickname in my mind for Leitha is "bone crusher" because she always offers a 'lethal' Leitha handshake in the choir during the "Greet Your Neighbor" portion of our service. Do not underestimate her strength!

Leitha's father Lyle's parents came to the U.S. from England and her mother Olga's parents came from Sweden. Lyle and Olga Warner were married at FUPC. They were blessed on December 01, 1930 with the birth of their daughter Leitha Joy Vollick (nee Warner). Leitha is now 92 years young. Her sister Priscilla lives in Massachusetts, her brother Gary has passed on and her brother Richard resides in the Jacob Eddy Veterans Home in Marquette, MI. Choir member Judy Bawks is also a relative of the Warner family.

As a child, Leitha attended Algonquin Methodist Church near Sherman Park. These were the years when she was inspired to become a Sunday School teacher due to the example set by Mrs. Erickson. Later, in 1946, while attending Sault High School, her friend Jeannie O'Neil persuaded her to join the FUPC Choir. (Point of Information: I believe this means that Leitha has been in our choir for 77 years!!) The 1946 Choir was led by organist Andy Baker. FUPC was led by Rev. David McClean when Leitha placed membership with our church congregation.

Also in 1946, Leitha joined the Soo Rockettes Women's Hockey League. It is my understanding that any opponent showing the nerve to score a goal against Leitha and the Soo Rockettes earned retribution of hair-pulling (Seriously, Leitha pulling hair???). (I do not think this was taken into account when she became a Sunday School teacher...) Leitha was Co-Captain of the hockey team and played from 1946-1950. In the Team picture, Leitha is second from bottom right.

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In 1950, Leitha married Howard Emerson Vollick who was employed as our church custodian and also worked at Soo Lumber. Leitha and Howard had 4 children, Linda (born 1951) who helped with Church Bulletins, Nancy (1953-2021), Steven (1958-1969) who died tragically from toxemia/appendectomy at 10 years old, and Todd (born 1965) who still works at Soo Lumber. Sadly, Leitha lost her husband Howard in 2014 at the age of 83. In addition to their four children, Leitha and Howard have 10 grandchildren, 26 great-grandchildren, and 1 great-great-grandchild.

Perhaps, in our congregation, Leitha is most known for teaching Sunday school for 50 (yes, I said FIFTY!) years. What inspired her? In 1957, when her daughter Nancy was 3 years old, she was uncomfortable going into Elizabeth Sutton's Sunday school class with 24 children. So, Leitha took Nancy to the four year olds class. One thing led to another and Leitha ended up teaching 3 year/4 year/ or 5 year olds from 1960 to 2010! Leitha says she loved teaching the children. This is evident from the multiple scrapbooks with photos, newspaper clippings and other memorabilia from her teaching career.

Clearly Leitha has a lot of energy because in 1967 she started as a Nurses Aide at War Memorial Hospital. She retired from War Memorial Hospital a mere 25 years later in 1992.



I'll be honest, brothers and sisters, if I had the time and space to do so, Leitha came to our interview prepared with enough photos, articles, and other information for me to write a lengthy series of books about her exemplary life. If you don't know her well, take the time, she is a TREASURE and a delight!

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

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
